

HOLMES A ROMAN CATHOLIC.

The Murderer Admitted to That Faith Last Thursday.

PHILADELPHIA, April 17.—H. H. Holmes, the murderer, has been admitted to the Roman Catholic faith through the rite of baptism. The Rev. Father P. J. Dailey, accompanied by the Rev. Fathers D. E. Cantillon, Higgins, and McCabe, visited the county prison yesterday, and performed the ceremony. The condemned man went through the service solemnly, his eyes seldom wandering from Father Dailey's face. The baptism was made conditional, because Holmes had previously been baptized according to the Protestant faith.

Father Dailey states that Holmes was to all appearances sincere in his professions of repentance, and that he is apparently resigned to his execution, which will take place on May 7.

Did Not Intend to Commit Suicide.

Mrs. Henrietta Marion, thirty-two years old, was arrested in Battery Park yesterday afternoon because the police thought she contemplated suicide. She lost her husband three months ago, and has since been very despondent. She went to the home of her brother-in-law, Charles Landgraf of 48 Van Brunt Street, Brooklyn, last Thursday. He took her to the Battery yesterday, thinking the trip would do her good, and while she was temporarily alone she approached the Battery wall and began to weep. When arrested she said she was only grieving over the loss of her husband, and had no intention of committing suicide.

Knew Where He Would Go.

"Do you know where you will go if you do not tell the truth?" asked Magistrate Mott, in the Centre Street Court, yesterday afternoon, of Harry Haniff, a newsboy, twelve years old, living at 52 Allen Street.

"Yes, Sir, I do," replied the lad.

"Where will you go?"

"To the Gerry Society, Sir."

The boy was complainant against George Eayrer, a driver, twenty-two, at 425 East Eightieth Street, whom he charged with striking him a blow in the face with his fist. Magistrate Mott imposed a fine of \$1.
